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# What is an Academic Vision?

An academic vision is a clear, forward-looking statement that outlines a school's priorities, goals, and values for student learning and development over the course of a year (or longer). It serves as a roadmap that guides everything from classroom instruction to student support, ensuring that all efforts—by teachers, students, and families—are aligned toward shared growth.

**At its core, an academic vision answers key questions:**

- What kind of growth do we want to see in our students?
- What skills, habits, and values matter most?
- How will we get there—together?

This includes learning how to handle disappointment and correction, care for peers, speak honestly and kindly, and reflect a Christlike example in everyday moments.

## 2. Academic Growth in Literacy, Math, Science and Humanities

### Primary Goal:

Maximizing your child's potential is our mission, and we pursue that through academic growth. Our goal is for your child to grow at least one full academic year in core subjects—reading, writing, language, and math—measured by reliable tools like NWEA MAP, PSAT/SAT, rubrics, and classroom performance. This year, we're also renewing our focus on excellent literature. Great books develop vocabulary, comprehension, empathy, and discernment. Across all grades, your child will engage with works that help shape wise, compassionate thinkers.

Whether your child excels or needs more time, we support growth through learning services such as the Mosaic program, tutoring, and enrichment opportunities. These supports promote confidence, independence, and deep understanding for every learner.

### Our Commitment

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Teachers will use reliable tools and clear rubrics to assess and communicate your child's academic growth. We will support and appropriately challenge every learner.

### We Challenge Your Child

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To struggle well, think deeply, and grow consistently through hard work and curiosity. For those who are early readers, or for students facing tougher academic challenges in later years, we will work alongside you. Dads and moms, we know how deeply you care about your child's confidence—we do too. If your child has faced challenges or setbacks, we will support their progress and celebrate the growth that is uniquely theirs. (Proverbs 4:7, Philippians 4:8).

### We Ask You

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Support homework habits, reading routines, and timely communication with teachers. Ask your child about what they're learning and reading.

## 3. Play, Challenge, and Teamwork Through Competition and Performance

### Primary Goal:

From imaginative play in early years to athletics, mock trial, math clubs, and fine arts, we want your child to take part in joyful and team-based experiences that grow into meaningful challenges. Play lays the foundation for healthy risk-taking and discovery. These experiences develop discipline, resilience, and courage—not just skill. (Ecclesiastes 3:13, 1 Corinthians 9:24–25)

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We will provide opportunities for your child to try new things, work toward a goal, and be part of a team.

### We Challenge Your Child

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To work hard, support teammates, show up under pressure, and represent Christ with humility and strength. If your child is still finding their place on the team or stage, we will help them grow in confidence and belonging over time. (Hebrews 12:1, Colossians 3:23). ## 4. Creation Through Projects, the Arts, and Service

### Primary Goal:

Creating is a core to being created in God's image. Your child will create meaningfully throughout the year, largely through projects or collaboration. Collaboration will largely be in the Fine Arts: choir, band, orchestra, and ensembles; many will participate in our drama programs. Others will be inspired by the rich history or literature they're reading—stories that spark imagination, reflection, and thoughtful response.

Through essays, speeches, artwork, or performances, your child will learn to respond to powerful ideas with both creativity and clarity. Many will reflect biblical truth, moral imagination, historical understanding, or gratitude to God.

### Our Commitment

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We will give students opportunities to write, build, perform, and serve in age-appropriate and thoughtful ways.

### We Challenge Your Child

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To reflect deeply, create boldly, and see their work as an offering to God and others. For some children, this is where they finally come alive—in song, paint, performance, or service. Moms and dads, if your child blooms here, we celebrate that with you. Every student brings a different kind of creativity—some quiet, some bold—and we want each one to know their voice matters. (Genesis 1:27, Exodus 35:31–35).

### We Ask You

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Celebrate effort and originality. Ask about what your child is creating and why it matters.

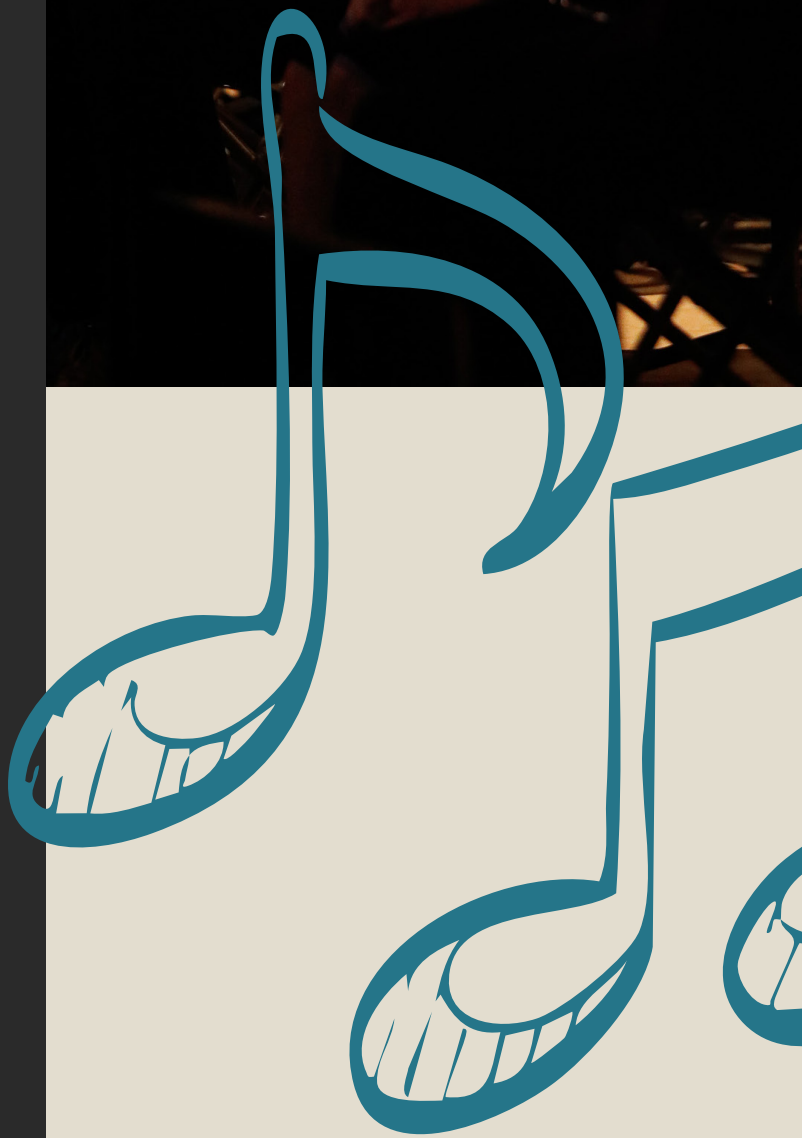

# 5. Leadership Through Responsibility and Initiative

## Primary Goal:

As your child matures, those same seeds grow into initiative, ownership, mentoring, and more visible forms of service—like organizing events, leading prayer, speaking publicly, or supporting team efforts.

Wherever your child is in their journey, we are committed to helping them develop a heart for service, a growing sense of purpose, and the courage to lead with humility. We aim to nurture leadership that lasts—built on self-awareness, thoughtful action, and faithful influence.

## Our Commitment

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We will offer age-appropriate opportunities for your child to lead and serve, both formally and informally.

## We Challenge Your Child

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To show up, speak up, and lead by example—not just with confidence, but with integrity. Whether leadership looks like quiet consistency or taking the mic, we want your child to discover the strength of servant-hearted influence. Moms and dads, we'll help them get there. For those still growing into leadership, we commit to walking with them and helping them recognize their influence. (Matthew 20:26–28, 1 Timothy 4:12).

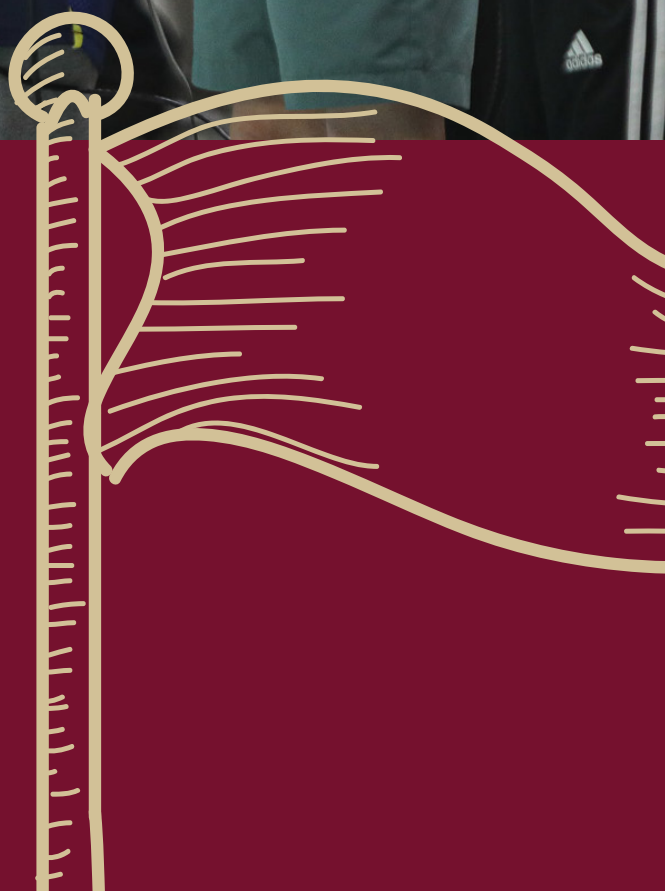

# 6. Technology and Attention

## Primary Goal:

We aim to develop discernment and habits of presence in a distracted world. This year, we are intentionally teaching students when and how to use technology more wisely—and when to set it aside in favor of in-person learning, paper-based tools, or quiet reflection. We believe that some technology can support learning, but it must never replace thinking. Educational technology can extend access, but should not replace attention.

By cultivating habits that support attention, engagement, comprehension, and long-term memory, we aim to help your children steward their time and focus well. These choices not only enhance learning but also bring greater joy, freedom, and meaningful relationships. For students who feel distracted, anxious, or unsure where they fit, we will patiently help them form healthy habits and feel at home in their learning journey.

And through all of this, we want to guide and form them in a way that trains them up in the way they should go, preparing them for a life of wisdom, service, and purpose.

## Our Commitment

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We will maintain clear boundaries around device use in class and reinforce habits of focus and presence.

## We Challenge Your Child

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To value in-person learning, use tech wisely, and grow in self-control. If your child is still building healthy boundaries, or struggles with screen time or focus, we'll guide them with grace and structure. We know you're modeling this at home too—and we thank you for it. (Romans 12:2, Psalm 90:12).

## We Ask You

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Limit recreational tech use during the week. Model focused attention. Reinforce family rhythms and shared learning.
